

Happy St Patty's Day from Blogs By Heather! This month I would like to follow up on the "share buttons" concept and show you how to add a "Follow Me" area to your site. We will also have a little HTML lesson towards the end!

FOLLOW ME





This type of format is concise and does not take up a lot of space in your blog's sidebar. The Twitter and Facebook icons are recognizable but you may create your own. In the HTML code provided below I include the code for these and you are free to use them on your site!

HTML CODE:

You will be adding this HTML code in your sidebar with links to your business/personal Twitter and Facebook accounts.



Blogger:

- 1. Login to Blogger and from the Dahsboard, click on Design.
- 2. Click on Page Elements.
- 3. Click on Add a Gadget and choose HTML/JavaScript.



- 4. Enter a Title such as Follow Me.
- 5. Copy and paste in the HTML CODE referenced in this article.
- 6. Click Save.
- 7. Drag and drop where you would like this shown in your sidebar.
- 8. Save Changes.

TypePad:

- 1. Login to TypePad and click on Design.
- 2. Click on Content.
- 3. From the middle box at the top, Modules, click on Embed Your Own HTML.



- 4. Then on the right, under Details, click Add This Module.
- 5. It is then added to your layout.
- 6. You can enter a Label, however it will not appear when viewing your blog.
- 7. Therefore, in the larger text box, write "FOLLOW ME
" which is the word "FOLLOW ME" capitalize and then followed by a hard return.
- 8. Then copy and paste the HTML CODE provided in this article.
- 9. Click OK.
- 10. Click and drag where you desire and remember to Save Changes at the bottom.

WordPress:

- 1. Login to WordPress and go to the Dashboard.
- 2. Click on Appearance and then Widgets.

3. Then click and drag a Text Widget to your sidebar.

Text

Arbitrary text or HTML

- 4. Enter a Title.
- 5. Copy and Paste the HTML CODE provided in this article.
- 6. Save.
- 7. Close.
- 8. Drag and drop where you would like in the sidebar.

A Little on HTML

So what does this HTML CODE provided mean anyway? Well, let's review it and a little HTML lesson.

First, most of the HTML tags comes in pairs, opening and closing tags. In this example you will notice <CENTER> and </CENTER> and <A> and

The tag is not paired and neither is the
 if you need to use that (which is a hard return, line break). Instead a "/" is used before the closing bracket. So it would be <IMG.../> and

Furthermore the <CENTER> tag is depreciated however without going into a CSS lesson, and since it still works and read by many popular browsers (Internet Explorer, FireFox, Safari), I used it here in this example.

Center Text or Image

It simply means to center any image or text between the opening <CENTER> tag and the closing </CENTER> tag.

So, as you can see in the opening image, the Twitter and Facebook images are centered.

Creating a HyperLink

Next, when you need to create a link, whether it be text or an image, you need to use the ANCHOR tag, which is denoted by the <A HREF.... > text or image here.

In this example, the HREF is the hyperlink to your Twitter or Facebook account. TARGET is set to _blank to force Twitter and Facebook to open in a new Internet window.

Inserting an Image

To insert an image using HTML code you use the IMAGE tag denoted by <IMG.../>.



In this example, you will see two sets of IMAGE tags where the SRC is a location in my public Photobucket account, and free for you to use!
